



Localized Areas of Power Impacts Can't Be Ruled Out!

## **OVERVIEW:**

- Long duration winter storm will bring mixed precipitation across most of the region
- Corridor of significant ice is possible and will have to be watched for power outage threats as weighted tree limbs could snap or come in contact with power lines
- Travel impacts due to snow, sleet and freezing rain, especially across the interior

TIMING	<ul> <li>Event will start late Friday night and last through the day on Saturday</li> <li>Lull in the storm Saturday night before increasing on Sunday once again</li> <li>Storm will end Sunday night with rain showers on Monday</li> </ul>
HAZARDS & IMPACTS	<ul> <li><u>Winter Storm Watch</u> has been issued for mixed precipitation</li> <li>Icing of trees will cause some tree branches to snap and others to be weighed down. The power outage threat is limited, but the potential still exists for the power outage threat to raise to elevated, especially across Central New Hampshire and Oxford County, Maine.</li> <li>Snow and sleet will lead to slick travel, especially on Saturday with heavy snowfall rates possible.</li> <li>Storm will end as rain on Monday for all areas, shedding any ice.</li> </ul>
