Remnants of Beryl Arrive Today

Elevated Severe and Flood Threat

OVERVIEW

- The remnants of Beryl will bring a tropical-like airmass to the region later today into tonight.
- Flash flooding and severe storms with damaging winds will be the main concerns.

Greatest flood threat exists from this afternoon through Thursday morning. TIMING Greatest severe threat is from midday through this evening A Flood Watch is in effect for most counties in Maine and New Hampshire where 1 to 3 **FLOOD** inches of rain, locally up to 5 inches is possible. RELATED WPC issued a rare Moderate Risk for excessive rainfall and rapid onset flooding (Level 3) **HAZARDS &** of 4) for the White Mountains region of New Hampshire. There is a Slight Risk (Level 2 of **IMPACTS** 4) all remaining areas. • Considerable impacts are possible for areas with repeating activity. Highest threat areas are those that have been primed by recent storms as well as highly sloped, fast-responding small streams. River flooding is not expected, however rapid rises are likely to occur. Campers and recreational users along riverbanks should closely monitor conditions, especially Wednesday night through Thursday. More information can be found on the <u>NWS Gray EM Flood Page</u> • There is a **Slight Risk** of Severe Thunderstorms (Level 2 of 5) for far western New **SEVERE** Hampshire counties and a Marginal Risk for the remainder of New Hampshire into RELATED western Maine. **HAZARDS &** The primary hazard is damaging winds. A couple tornadoes may be possible.




